Kassie Siegel is senior counsel and director of the Center for Biological Diversity's Climate Law Institute. The Center is a non-profit membership organization which combines conservation biology with litigation, policy advocacy, and an innovative strategic vision in working to secure a future for animals and plants hovering on the brink of extinction, for the wild areas they need to survive, and by extension for the physical, spiritual, and cultural welfare of generations to come.

Siegel develops and implements campaigns for the reduction of greenhouse gas pollution and the protection of wildlife threatened by global warming, and has litigated under statutes including the Endangered Species Act, National Environmental Policy Act, Clean Air Act, and California Environmental Quality Act. Siegel is the author of the Petition submitted in 2005 seeking protection of the polar bear under the Endangered Species Act, and counsel in ongoing multidistrict polar bear litigation. She was named one of the ten most influential California lawyers of the decade by the Daily Journal in 2010 for her work on global warming and endangered species protection, and a 2007 California Lawyer Magazine "California Lawyer Attorney of the Year" for environmental law.

Siegel is a graduate of the Boalt Hall School of Law at the University of California. Prior to law school she was a natural history guide leading wilderness trips in Alaska.
